



Understanding Your Infant's Cues

Playing detective can help you to figure out what your infant is trying to say. See our helpful chart below for some common cues babies often share.

Opening eyes wide	Interested, surprised	Start to play (try peek-a-boo)	
Looking away	Bored, overwhelmed	Allow for downtime	
Blinking	Fighting against being	Allow for downtime

Smiling	Content, happy, familiar	Smile back and say, "Look at	
		your big smile! Are you happy	
		to see me?"	
Frowning	Unhappy, confused	Try and figure out what could	
		be upsetting your baby and	
		comfort them

Arching back	Upset	Try and figure out what could	
		be upsetting your baby and

Squirming	Uncomfortable	Try and figure out what could	
		be upsetting your baby and	
		comfort them	
Clenching hands, stiffening	Tense, excited	Use a calm voice and

Kicking, waving arms	Alert, excited	Act excited too and tell your	
		baby what you are excited for	
Staring blankly, yawning,	Tired	Time to sleep (respond as
